The personal statement is a key part of your UCAS application. You have a limited space to tell universities who you are, what you want to do, and why they should accept you.

Writing about yourself can be a difficult task, particularly if you don't have a lot of experience doing so. Don't worry - we're here to help!

Before you begin

The personal statement is one of the final sections of your UCAS application. However, you shouldn't leave it until the last minute. Give yourself plenty of time to write.


