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INTRODUCTION TO THE UNIVERSITY



We are delighted that you have applied to study at Edinburgh Napier University. We would be delighted if you choose to study for your degree with us, and this guide outlines some of the reasons why we think you should, as well as providing key information about funding, accommodation and studying in the School of Applied Sciences. It also contains your programme for your Applicant Visit Day.

Studying for a degree not only enhances your employment prospects, but enables you to go beyond the classroom and meet students from all over the world, experience different cultures, learn important life skills and make life-long friendships; and all whilst living in the Number 1 city in the UK! (Quality of Life Index 2015)

THE SCHOOL OF APPLIED SCIENCES

Studying for a degree within the School of Applied Sciences teaches you to do just that – apply the theory to real-world problems and people, and make an impact on society and individuals. You'll have access to some of the best teaching and laboratory facilities in the country, learning techniques and practices that are used across the social and sport science industries.

Social Sciences

We are a Top 10 modern UK university for psychology and social sciences (Guardian University Guide 2015). Students have access to purpose built labs and data analysis software, enabling them to conduct research and other practical work. In addition to specialist labs for perception, eye tracking, observation of social interaction, we also have numerous experimental interview rooms supported by state of the art video cameras and editing facilities. Our Psychology courses are also accredited by the British Psychological Society.

Sports Sciences

Sports sciences students spend much of their time developing their knowledge in our biomechanics and human performance labs. We have the largest environmental chamber in Scotland, so you can send someone to Everest Base Camp or the Amazon rainforest without even leaving the room.

In 2016 we opened our new £2.9million sports centre, expanding our weights training facilities and adding a 20m running track and studios. Our partnership with the BT Sport Scottish Rugby Academy enables us to play a key role in the development of Scotland's future sporting talent and you to attend lectures given by sporting professionals at the peak of their game. We also have a healthy range of sports teams and societies which play at local and national level- see p.15 for more information.





GO BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Our Psychology programme provides students with the opportunity to complete a work placement through the university's Getting Inside scheme or an internship through the university careers service. Our Sports courses offer opportunity to study in Germany or the USA for a semester and all offer a work-based learning opportunity within the programme to help you develop employability as well as academic skills.

WHAT OUR STUDENTS THINK

Criminology student Danielle McDowall spent a week shadowing the work of Police Scotland as part of the University's Getting Inside scheme. She visited police stations, a forensic lab, the Scottish Parliament and Edinburgh Sherriff Court during a week spent with officers from Police Scotland.

"My favourite part was probably meeting the Superintendent who was very nice and very open. We did a Q&A session with him and he answered all our questions, covering topics as varied as police training, the importance of intelligence and how to police large, open spaces like The Meadows in Edinburgh..."

Danielle believes that although the experience was valuable in itself, it has helped even more with her career choice: *"It was great seeing the different aspects of policing and what you could do. It's definitely helped with my course but has also made me determined to apply to the police."*



ACCOMMODATION

We have 3 accommodation sites situated in Edinburgh's West End. The vast majority of our rooms are single study bedrooms with ensembles, however some shared rooms are available. All rooms are self-catered and have access to a shared kitchen and living space.

We are able to guarantee an offer of accommodation to Care Leavers and students coming from outwith the EH postcode area who apply before the guarantee date in August 2017. We can also provide support for those not eligible for our guarantee but who are seeking private student accommodation options. In order to apply for accommodation you

must have an unconditional offer, which you have firmly accepted via UCAS.

The online application system will go live from May 2017 and students will need their Edinburgh Napier Number in order to apply. You can find your Edinburgh Napier Number on correspondence from our Admissions team. At the time of applying you will need to make a £500 advance rent payment, which will be taken from your final rent payment of the year.

for Applicants with offers

Accepting your offer

We hope you will choose to make Edinburgh Napier your first choice institution and to do so you must make your choices via UCAS Track (www.ucas.com/track). Once you have received decisions on all of your applications, UCAS will contact you directly and let you know the deadline by which you need to make your firm and insurance choices.

Change of circumstances

If you make any changes in your studies, particularly if you decide to drop a subject, please let the Admissions Team know as this may impact on your offer.

Deferring your place

If you would like to defer your place, please email the Admissions Team outlining why you wish to defer and how you are intending to use your gap year. For most of our programmes we accept requests to defer, although there may be a small number of subject areas where this is not possible.

Conditional Offer Holders- meeting your conditions

For students undertaking Highers, Advanced Highers and A-Levels, the University receives your results directly from UCAS and you do not need to send us copies of your qualifications.

For students taking other qualifications, such as HNC, HND, BTEC, IB etc, you will need to send your results to us when you receive these. You are advised to scan and email your results to the Admissions Team as soon as you have these to enable a final decision to be taken on your application.

Unconditional Offer Holders

If you are holding an unconditional offer of admission and have not already done so, you need to send a copy of your qualifications to the Admissions Team for checking purposes.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Can I change the course I am holding an offer for?

This depends on the individual course. Where possible and where you meet the minimum stated entry requirements we will try to accommodate a change. However, this cannot always be guaranteed and does vary between courses.

I am holding a deferred offer for next year's entry, but now want to come this year. Is this possible?

You need to contact us to discuss this. Unfortunately this is not straightforward and will depend on whether we still have places available. Please put your request in writing via email to the Admissions Team, who will look into it and get back to you as soon as possible.

My circumstances have changed and I no longer want to go to University, who do I tell?

Please contact the Admissions Team via email to inform them of your decision. Additionally you can contact UCAS who will inform the University that you do not wish to proceed with your application.

What if I don't meet the conditions of my offer - will I still get in?

This very much depends on how other applicants have performed in their examinations. The University has a government target for its Scottish/EU

student intake- it must meet (not exceed) this target. If a high number of students meet their conditions, then there may be less scope to operate leniency for those who have just missed their conditions.

Final decisions are taken looking at the full UCAS application and your overall academic achievements. If there have been personal circumstances which you think have had an impact on your performance, you should send details to the Admissions Team. This should also normally include a supporting statement from your School/College. This information will be considered alongside your examination results.

What happens next?

Once you are holding an unconditional firm offer of admission, you are confirmed to come to us. From July onwards you will be sent information on preparing for your studies, induction and matriculation (formally enrolling at the University).

DISABILITY & INCLUSION TEAM

What does the Disability & Inclusion Team do?

We provide information, advice and support for students who have any kind of disability, long term health condition (including mental health difficulties) or specific learning difficulty (such as Dyslexia) that might have an impact while you are at university.

GO INTERNATIONAL... WITH EDINBURGH NAPIER

Study or Work Abroad as part of your degree.



Co-funded by the Erasmus+ programme of the European Union

You don't need to take a gap year to see the world, meet new people and become more independent. As an Edinburgh Napier student you can study or work abroad from 3 months up to a full academic year, the the time you spend abroad counts as part of your degree.

Going on exchange doesn't make your course any longer either. What it does do is give you the chance to live like a local and really get to know another country and culture; and at the same time you can learn more about your degree subject from another perspective.

Do I need to know the language?

Regardless of your future, current or previous studies, you can still experience living and studying or working abroad during your time at Edinburgh Napier. Don't worry if foreign languages aren't your strong point! Our partner institutions

offer their courses in English. You'll be part of a fantastic international community, and there will be plenty of opportunities to learn the local languages if that is what you want to do!



How much does it cost?

You don't pay tuition fees to your host university while you're abroad, and if you study in Europe through the Erasmus+ programme*, you can get a monthly grant to help pay for your living costs. You may also be eligible for extra funding if you have a disability or if you come from a household with a lower income.

In 2015/16 our students on exchange in Europe received between €1400 - €2000 per semester and those on work placements around €450 per month.

If going on exchange is a compulsory part of your degree, check with your local funding body as they may be able to cover your travel expenses too.

Will it help me in my career?

Brand new confidence, self-reliance, problem solving ability, enhanced communication skills- these are just a few benefits of going abroad. Your international experiences, apart from helping shape a brilliant personality, will shine on your CV and give you something great to talk about at future interviews!

Our Careers Team will be on hand before, during and after your exchange to help you identify and develop the skills which make you attractive to employers.

*The UK's future participation in the Erasmus+ programme will form part of the UK Governments negotiations on leaving the European Union. Membership by non-EU countries is possible so it is hoped that a positive outcome will be achieved on this topic.

FEES AND FUNDING FOR SCOTTISH & EU STUDENTS

Am I eligible?

If your permanent place of residence is in Scotland or the EU, you intend to study in Scotland, and are studying full time for your first degree, you are likely to be eligible to apply for the full amount of your tuition fees to be paid.

Depending on your household income and personal circumstances, you may also be eligible to apply for additional financial support, such as living cost loans.



EU Students

Following the EU Referendum in June 2016, the Scottish Government has pledged to fund the tuition fees of EU students commencing their studies in Scotland in 2017. If, at a future date, the Student Awards Agency Scotland no longer pays the tuition fees for any student who commenced their studies in September 2017, and who are or would have been eligible for that support under current arrangements, the University will meet the subsequent cost of tuition fees for the intended duration of these students' studies.

Applying for funding

Applications for your tuition fees to be paid should be made to Student Awards Agency Scotland (SAAS). SAAS will ordinarily arrange for your tuition fees to be paid and assess your eligibility to receive maintenance support.

Bursaries and Scholarships

Edinburgh Napier is determined that no student should have to leave their studies as a result of financial hardship. Therefore we offer a variety of funds to support students who may find themselves in financial difficulty- for example the Discretionary Fund, Care Leavers Bursary and the Childcare Fund. We also offer scholarships to assist students with studying abroad.

Fees and Bursaries

Fees

Fees for Rest of UK (RUK) undergraduate students commencing their course in 2017/18 are £9000 per year, but the good news is that if you complete the first three years of your course the fourth year is free!

You can enjoy the greater breadth and depth of study from a four year course whilst only paying fees for the first 3 years of a four year course (or four years where your degree is 5 years in length).

You will be able to apply for a tuition fee loan from the UK Government, and the cost of your fees will be paid directly to Edinburgh Napier University. Each region has its own arrangements for providing maintenance support through student loans and grants.

Bursaries

The following bursaries are available to all students from England, Wales and Northern Ireland who meet the eligibility criteria below.

Eligible students are entitled to apply for both bursaries.

The Edinburgh Napier University Merit Bursary - £1000 per year of study.

Available to students who meet the following criteria.

- Matriculated students of Edinburgh Napier University entering the university in September 2017;
- Registered on a full time undergraduate course;
- Have been assessed as having to pay the full Rest of UK tuition fee (£9000 per year for students starting in 2017);
- Achieve BBB or higher in their A-Levels or equivalent qualifications;
- AND accept the university as their first choice via UCAS.

The Edinburgh Napier University Access Bursary – up to £2000 per year of study.

Available to students who meet the following criteria:

- From low income families* AND
- Started their programme of study here at Edinburgh Napier University on or after September 2012 AND
- Have been assessed as having to pay the full Rest of UK tuition fee (£9000 per year for students starting in 2017).

*Value of bursary:

£2000 per year of study for those students with a residual household income of £25,000 or less;

£1000 per year of study for those students with a residual household income of between £25,001 and £42,600.
